God-seeds, reflections from Marc Stewart



We have three "members-in-discernment" in the Montana - N.Wyoming Conference UCC: Laura Keating, Larry Meidinger, and Lisa Harmon. Members-in-discernment are people who especially know and live the energy expressed in Tagore's poem. Officially, members-in-discernment are those among us who are pursuing authorized ministry in the United Church of Christ. Our Church and Ministry Commission meets regularly with members-in-discernment to explore their their path to authorized ministry. The Commission also assigns mentors to accompany them on their discernment journey.

Laura Keating is a member of First UCC Billings. Laura has preached, offered solos in worship, and leads a monthly "Spiritualty on Tap" at a local brewery. She has accepted a dean's full-ride scholarship to Boston University School of Theology beginning this fall, with the hope of returning to this conference after completing her Master of Divinity in three years.

Larry Meidinger is a member of Butte UCC. Larry, too, has preached and offered solos in worship. He works at the Acadia Children's Hospital in Butte as cook, where he also offers Sunday worship to the children at Acadia.

Lisa Harmon is a member of First UCC Billings, where she serves as Minister for Healing and Community Transformation. As Mike Mulberry describes Lisa's ministry with the church, they are co-equals in ministry. Lisa is currently being authorized as a licensed minister on her path to ordination through the Church and Ministry Commission. You will see a lot of Lisa as she leads a round table at CAM and as she leads the Wellness and Yoga Camp at Mimanagish during the last week of June.

There are so many forms of service in our conference and churches. Of course, most service does not require ministerial authorization, but it truly is a joy to see these three ministries unfold among us. In service to answering their call to ministry, our "members-in-discernment" show a joy inspiring us to hope. We share in the joy that children are being blessed in worship, by the joy we hear of Larry's ministry at Acadia. We share in the joy that the downtown community in Billings is finding sacred space to meet, by the joy Lisa shares in welcoming others. We share in the joy that the intensive Master of Divinity journey being engaged by Laura is deepening this young adult's leadership in the UCC.



The Three Mission Priorities of the MT-NWy Conference UCC:



1.
All congregations will be vital and viable



Billings First Congregational Church partnered with the Montana Voter Policy Institute to bring progressive Christian blogger and author, John Pavlovitz, to Billings. The event drew over 250 people and showed the deep, spiritual hunger of so many people who have often been historically harmed by the church. Pavlovitz believes we need to "build a bigger table" through radical hospitality, total authenticity, true diversity, and agenda-free community. Once fired from his megachurch, Pavlovitz found the freedom to be the courageous, humorous, and wise disciple of Christ that is attracting people inside and outside the church. In keeping with the heart of the UCC, Billings First Congregational Church continues to offer events in partnership with the wider community to feed the deep spiritual hunger



Confirmation Sunday at Baker Community Church on April 29 included four youth, one who was also baptized. This was one of the largest attended services of the year, with 30 adults and children.

## 2. The Conference will be appropriately staffed and the staff will be justly compensated.

The Church and Ministry Commission and Board of Directors are recommending <u>updated Clergy Compensation Guidelines</u>. These will be voted upon at CAM. The quidelines include a 2% increase over the 2015/16 guidelines, and new guidelines for part-time ministries.

## 3. The Conference will offer transformative experiences and have an active presence in places where we are not now present.

Mimanagish offers a place of transformation where lives are changed by the community and place that camp is. It is also the primary means by which the conference reaches out to places and people where we have not otherwise been present. Among the outreach possible this year, 8 children Ballantine UCC's meal program have heard about camp and would like to attend. They need scholarship support. If you have scholarship support available to add to the <u>Carlee Downer scholarship</u> fund, we will assure that these children can come to Mimanagish this summer.

#### A Global View

It was just a bed, a simple bed. Yet, to the people who were the recipients of one of these beds that we delivered to the individuals in the villages of San Pedro de Marcoris, these beds were a gift of luxury, comfort, and love. On this particular day of our Global Ministries pilgrimage to the Dominican Republic, we headed to the small, rural communities that our mission partners serve; we went with beds in tow. You and I would call them something just above the classification of a cot, a simple approximately 3 inch-thick mattress with a frame that folded like a single rollaway bed. Our partner mission organization, the Social Services of the Dominican Churches, organized our visit and does social work in many areas of the Dominican Republic.

Now, some background on these villages. For years, sugar cane production provided decent paying jobs for many Dominicans and Haitian immigrants. The demand for labor brought thousands of these immigrants to work for the cane companies. Fast forward to the late 20th century when these companies could no longer compete economically in the global market, and they sold off their land, leaving thousands unemployed. Both Dominicans and Haitians living there had to seek new opportunities and ways to make a living. To complicate things, Haitians, most that

country. Their lot in life has been difficult, or even disastrous. Our partners are working on social justice for these "citizen less" peoples, but in the mean time they are limited to lives of extreme poverty.

On our first stop that day, we arrived at a village with dirt streets and dilapidated houses. The first bed delivery was to a man, probably in his late 30s. He is suffering with severe complications from muscular dystrophy, no longer able to walk. Living in a shack with his parents, they all became homeless when fire gutted their dwelling. They still don't have a home, but they had built a make-shift area in which to do cooking. He was sitting in a chair when we arrived with his new bed; tears streamed down his face as we did a group blessing for him and his parents that the love of God might bring them better days ahead. (Tears streamed down my face, too.)

The second bed was delivered to a blind man in another village. He was a Haitian former sugar cane worker who has survived only out of the generosity of his neighbors and our partners. It is difficult to describe in words the poverty and dilapidated structures of this village and the dwelling that this man called home. Again, we offered a blessing for him and his new bed, and we were each able to greet him personally. The look of gratitude on his unseeing face is a picture painted in my memory forever.

The last stop of the day was to visit an elderly couple in this same village who had received a bed from our partners the week prior. We walked to their dwelling, and they came out to greet us with smiles as broad and bright as the day's sunshine. When asked about their twin-size bed, the little man reported that he had not yet used it because it was too clean and he didn't want to dirty it. They then invited us into their home. We were hesitant and didn't want to infringe on their privacy, but they insisted. This was an experience almost impossible to describe, yet it was comforting to accept their graciousness. Yes, the work we do with our partners through Global Ministries touches lives, even in the simplest ways. We make a difference when we work with our partners to do God's work around the globe.

I serve on the Global Ministries Board which is the name for the work that the United Church of Christ and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) share with neighbors all over the world. We work with 290 partner churches, councils, and religious organizations and institutions in more than 70 countries worldwide. Global Ministries is currently focusing on our Caribbean Initiative "Embrace the Sprit." As part of that focus, a small group of us board members were able to visit mission partners in one of our Initiative countries and witness first hand some of the work they do. Our pilgrimage took us to the Dominican Republic April 5-10th. It was an honor and humbling experience to learn about the work that our mission partners, along with our mission co-workers (the new term for our missionaries) are doing in this region of
