

Come to CAM and feel the blessing. Registrations are still being received.



The Three Mission Priorities of the MT-NWy Conference UCC:



1.
All congregations will be vital and viable

but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" --Micah 6: 8 [NRSV]



When I went to divinity school long ago and far away, we were pretty certain about what it meant to "do justice." Doing justice meant standing with the marginalized, advocating for the oppressed, eliminating racism and sexism and heterosexism, and dismantling the structures of empire.

And, of course, doing justice still means ALL of that and more today. So, at the Vital and Viable Churches Retreat, I listened and nodded approvingly as people from the more urban churches in our conference described some of the great things they're doing to "keep the walls of the church as transparent as possible," so that there will be less and less division between church members inside and those who spend most of their time on the streets surrounding the church. I am deeply inspired by, for instance, what Mike Mulberry and Lisa Harmon and the congregation of First Church Billings are doing to serve the chronic inebriate population in downtown Billings, and by the way that church respects and appreciates Native American spirituality, thereby bringing some of their near neighbors out of the shadows of downtown. Addressing matters of racism and addiction are clear examples of doing justice.

But what does doing justice look like in other parts of Montana, in non-urban places like Absarokee, where I serve, which is not even an incorporated town? I see inspiring examples of loving kindness and walking humbly with God in my church and my community every single day, but doing justice in rural Montana doesn't look the same as it does in cities.

Republicans who tend to think the same way would also do pretty well reaching consensus. But what about in my congregation, where the entire political spectrum is represented in the pews every Sunday? Can we get clear about doing justice in our context when just the words "social justice" raise hot-button political issues before we even get to the end of one sentence? [Side note: I actually think that having people of all political persuasions participating actively, side-by-side, in our church is evidence of viability and vitality, requiring justice and kindness and humility to blend together on a regular basis.]

Yes, we drink Fair Trade coffee and we are a "5 for 5" church, joining with our covenant partners throughout the denomination in reaching out around the country and around the globe. We do our best to work with other churches and other nearby organizations like the Senior Center and the VFW and the schools and many others to respond to real and current needs in the community.

About a year and a half ago, we started a food bank, which tries to respond to some of the less visible injustice in our community, allowing people to share some of what they have with others in the area who are going through a rough patch.

We also have a sense that one thing we're called to do is to offer a way of being church that is different from the large church down the road, a way that is more about sharing a journey than about sharing a set of clear-cut answers.

2. The Conference will be appropriately staffed and the staff will be justly compensated.

The Church and Ministry Commission and Board of Directors are recommending <u>updated Clergy Compensation Guidelines</u>. These will be voted upon at CAM. The quidelines include a 2% increase over the 2015/16 guidelines, and new guidelines for part-time ministries.

3. The Conference will offer transformative experiences and have an active presence in places where we are not now present.

Mimanagish offers a place of transformation where lives are changed by the community and place that camp is. It is also the primary means by which the conference reaches out to places and people where we have not otherwise been present. Among the outreach possible this year, 8 children Ballantine UCC's meal program have heard about camp and would like to attend. A special thank you to Plymouth UCC Helena, University UCC Missoula, Great Falls UCC, and People's UCC Sidney for scholarship support to these children. If you have scholarship support available to add to the <u>Carlee Downer scholarship</u> fund, we can assure that all who want can come to Mimanagish this summer.
