God-seeds

God Forever Graceful and Loving

Lord, you have been our dwelling place in all generations.

Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever you had formed the earth and the world, from everlasting to everlasting you are God.

Psalm 90, NRSV

An old British hymn has returned to my memory this past month, “O God, Our Help in Ages Past.” It seems so apropos to these times of pandemic. Humanity has been through this before. Plagues and disease of various types have so decimated past populations it seemed that only God could help.


I've even had my own encounters on the brink. Twenty-five years ago, I stepped into a hole in the middle of the raging spring waters of the Pere Marquette River (Michigan) and my fly-fishing waders flooded. I was swept into a 30-foot snag of downed trees and debris. The current tugged me to go under as I held onto a slippery fallen tree for dear life and tried to shimmy my way to shore. I knew I might die then and there. Five minutes later I was ashore. “There but for the grace of God” my time could have been up. Ironically, the earworm of the old hymn may not even have made it to the fifth verse, “Time like an ever-rolling stream soon bears us all away.” Perhaps I would have been just as glad not to have that in my mind if I was going down.

We are now living in a world different from anything most of us have ever known. It is not a thing which we can escape in an unaccountable five minutes of grace. How many of us have started the 15-day CoVid 19 incubation clock over and over again in a wait to see if we got exposed and infected? I did, after being in Seattle in January and L.A. in February, and the grocery store last week. How many adjustments can one make to their life perspective in a certain amount of time? There have been times in the past month when life changes have happened each week. There have been weeks when life changes have happened each day. There have been days when life changes have happened each hour. It seems forever since we started online worship in our churches, and another forever before that when we practiced 6-foot personal distancing from each other, and another forever before that when we elbow-bumped during church in the Passing of the Peace. How long ago before that was Christmas, when we gathered with hardly a care?

“A thousand ages in your sight are like an evening gone...” May it be so among us, because right now it feels like last week was a year ago. There has been so much reorientation in our lives that I am beginning to wonder how much of it is real. No, I am not

losing my mind (on a good day), but are all the zoom meetings, all the updates on how to keep protected, all the contrary political and health solutions offered, all the economic stimulus details really going to “save” us?

My father, a master mariner in the British Merchant Marines before going into authorized ministry, had engraved on his tombstone the continuing hymn verse:



This verse defined his call to ministry, when on his watch on a New York bound cargo ship he saw a sailor swept overboard during a North Atlantic storm. In my father's complete grief at that moment, the sun shone around the storm clouds, and he felt his call to a life of ministry. (The last time I heard my father preach in the year before he died of cancer, he shared this story.)

In my way, too, I keep watch for what is real among the present day warnings, advice, politics, and assistance. Even though it feels anything but short, I am beginning to sense again that the ways God is with us do not change. It is not a long wait with God:

The beauty of a new day is there to be appreciated, just like always.

The gift of companionship is offered even if not felt as a hug, elbow bump, or face to face smile.

The hope that “passes all understanding” is not mired down in yesterday’s, or the last hours, developments.

Some things of God never change. The final verse of the old hymn is almost the same as the first:

“O God our help in ages past, our hope for years to come,
Still be our God while troubles last, and our eternal home.
