As my first year comes to a close, I find myself evaluating my efforts towards those goals. But my selfevaluation is limited. Your input is invaluable as we continue to work together. While you ponder that, let me just offer you something I came across recently. I felt drawn to a book on my office shelf that I had read some years ago, <u>When the Heart Waits</u>, by Sue Monk Kidd. In it she shares the story of a friend who had put all her energies into climbing the corporate ladder. She was drained and feeling like she was in a midlife swamp. She took some time away, went to Maine where she took long walks in the country, often feverishly praying and pleading with God. But one day she came across a spider in the midst of spinning its web. She found herself captivated. She described the experience to Ms. Monk Kidd:

I sat on a stump for the longest time, watching the spider. And you know what? The most beautiful thing happened. This is the way you're supposed to pray, a voice inside me said. Just be quiet and still so that you can begin to see the thing God is already weaving. So that's what I've started to do."

I pray as we head into this second year on our journey together, as our council prepares to revisit Visioning this fall, that we will endeavor to "be quiet and still so that we can begin to see the thing God is already weaving." God is Still Speaking. God is in our midst. Thanks be to God!

Moderator's Musings

In my last offering I provided a brief history of who we are as a church. This one will provide some thoughts on where we are today and could be titled, "Why I am in this church?" If we are "nondoctrinal" then what do we believe? For me it started at church camp – Mimanagish – with a discussion led by Rev. Stacy Richards, then pastor in Great Falls. As we were discussing some bible passage, he said words to the effect, "Don't focus so much on the words that you miss the message." He gave us permission to not believe the literal scripture. Take Luke 10:25-37 - the story of the Good Samaritan – as an example. It's a parable. Does it matter if there wasn't a Levite or a priest who walked by on the other side – nope. The message is "Love your neighbor as yourself."

OK, that's an easy one. The point is "we" are allowed to question. We are folks with more questions than answers, as many doubts as certainties. As independents we are allowed and required to search, research, discuss to develop as much or little as we need and want. "No matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here." From decades ago to nearer term this has been a consistent message.

Not too long ago we were discussing who is welcome. Someone said, "...but they have to be Christians." **Nope.** We just need to look at Luke 10:25-37



again for the answer to "Who is my neighbor?" When do we get in trouble? The answer is quite simple; it is when we are intolerant of diversity; when we do not respect these wonderfully independent souls who are our neighbors, friends, and fellow travelers on life's journey.

From Council meeting minutes, July 17

FINANCIAL REPORT: Jim reported that we received a \$1000 check someone who attended our Baroque Music Montana concert in June. The \$1000 check originally in the memorial fund has since been transferred to Teamworks. We still are ahead of last year's donations. Curt and Jim are now in balance. Reminder to ask IGA for storage building rent.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Vanguard account has dropped according to market fluctuations. The new Endowment account with Vanguard is set up finally. Maurie will be added as 3rd endowment account mgr per the instructions of the Trustees. He mentioned that the 2nd half of the insurance is due this coming month. A check was written to Mission.

TRUSTEES REPORT: Bonnie reported that the Little Stone Church has been repainted by Viv Gerke and her crew. Maurie moved the Boy Scout flags to the coal room. The old minister chair has been moved to the sanctuary. Tables and chairs were moved back. Other items still to be disposed of or moved. Will determine if piano can be tuned.

DIACONATE: Food drive for Project Hope. Outdoor service at Fireman's Point on Aug 7. Adult overnight at Camp Mim-some of the buildings are available with bathrooms in them. If we could use them, about 8 people said they would consider going up for a day. TV situation- Jerry said that we have the equipment, it just needs to be installed. Jim will contact Mr. Stark for a microphone update. The Blessing of the Stulce Home is being postponed - Meg Hatch not available in August.

CHRISTINAN ED: Camp scholarships-No report from the conference as to whether we owe anything. MISSIONS: Mary reported all going well.

TEAMWORKS: Beth noted that \$1000 was received from the funeral of Donna Storer. It was recommended that someone from the Teamworks be present at functions in the fellowship hall, especially if they are using the kitchen.

PASTOR KATE: Camp was challenging because of the small number of campers. She is getting close to her one-year anniversary here at Columbus Community Congregational Church and looking forward to it. She plans to do some FB Live comments/discussion for Sunday mornings (see p1).

CHURCH CLERK: Rhonda reported by her report that it is very hot in the corner and smells of urine. Maurie said that we try putting fans in the windows on early in the mornings to cool it down. No action taken on portable air conditioners proposed by Rhonda. Will also check the registers to make sure that they are covered to alleviate the smell.

EARTHCARE: Joan will present, at our [zoom] conference annual meeting, a workshop about our church's EarthCare efforts & actions.

BUSINESS: There is a request from the conference that we do a short podcast/video about our church. One suggestion is to do a video of our outdoor service on August 7. Easy to do with a phone. Joan said that she has 2 numbers for piano tuners and would contact this week. Bonnie will contact Meadowlark to see if they would be interested in a piano if it can be tuned.

Rich Towards God

From Pastor Kate's sermon on July 31, 2022

Luke 12:13-21 contains *The Parable of the Rich Fool* and begins with someone saying, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the inheritance with me." Jesus replied, "Man, who appointed me a judge or an arbiter between you?" Then he added, "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; life does not consist in an abundance of possessions."

In Jesus' times it was not unusual for someone to appeal to a local rabbi to help resolve a legal matter. Law and religion were so closely intertwined that there was barely any distinction between a judge and a teacher. Jesus discerned that the man's legal concern was not the real problem; it was greed.

The misuse of wealth was a major topic in first century Palestine. Almost every chapter of Luke's Gospel has some reference to money. Greed is nothing more than a desire to have more than we actually have. Jesus used this exchange as an opportunity to explain why greed has no place in the Kingdom of God. Focusing on accumulation of wealth and goods isolates a person from others while the Kingdom of God---or *KINDOM* as it is more aptly called--- is about community, interconnectedness, living and working together for the glory of God.

Jesus tells the parable of the rich man who decided to tear down his barns and build bigger ones to store the excess grain from an especially abundant harvest. He would be well set for many

years. Isn't it wise and responsible to save for the future? The rich farmer worked hard and saved wisely so he now can relax and enjoy the fruits of his labor.



But there is one very important thing the rich man has not planned for — his reckoning with God, who said to him, "You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?" (Luke 12:20)

The rich farmer is a fool not because he is wealthy nor because he saves for the future, but because he appears to live only for himself and because he believes he can secure his life with possessions.

The rich man's land has produced abundantly, yet

he expresses no sense of gratitude to God or to the workers who have helped him plant and harvest this bumper crop. He has more grain in storage than he could ever use, yet seems to have no thought of sharing it with others, and no thought of what God might require of him. He is blind to the fact that his life belongs to God and that God can demand it back at any time.

When Jesus looks at the rich landowner reveling in his stores of grain, he sees a person drowning in self-absorption and oblivious to his own mortality. From the *Message* translation Luke 12:20-21: "Just then God showed up and said, 'Fool! Tonight you die. And your barnful of goods—who gets it? That's what happens when you fill your barn with Self and not with God."

What a terrible state to be in. Yet we can recognize it all around us and can recognize it within ourselves. We find plenty of ways to fill ourselves with worries, with distractions, with plans that exclude any thought of God.

Jesus conveys in this parable, the fate of an isolated, insecure soul who has forgotten human connection and forgotten that in the face of Death (the great equalizer) we are all naked paupers but for the grace of God.

In most translations the last line of the Luke passage admonishes us to be *rich towards God*. What does it mean to be "rich toward God?" Each of us can consider that meaning for ourselves. But perhaps we can begin with gratitude for how rich God is toward us and out of gratitude consider how we use our resources, how we use our talents, how we reflect God's love to one another and to all we

encounter. God is still speaking. God is in our midst. Thanks be to God.
